Principal's Report

Dear Parents

We hope all the wonderful mums, step-mums, carers, grandmas and bonus others in our community enjoyed their Mother's Day and most importantly the Mother's Day gift so lovingly chosen from our stall last week. If parents could see the thought and care our students put into choosing the right gift they would be overwhelmed. I might add, the pull of chocolates is always interesting to watch. We also send many positive thoughts to those who have lost their mum and mums who have suffered loss. A very big thank you again to those parents who volunteered to man the stall and help our students choose just the right gift.

The highlight of this week has been the special Vaucluse Lego Masters assembly we held on Wednesday afternoon. The afternoon was packed full of excitement. There were multiple activities: class questions, a Lego building challenge, Lego Trivia and a Lego colouring-in competition. Miss Vial and her students presented a project they have been working on – Robotics using Lego and she also shared that Lego was the reason behind her becoming an architect. We were very fortunate to have chief Lego Master and Vaucluse PS parent Hamish Blake curate the whole Lego afternoon. Hamish was able to answer some very challenging questions from our students. He was also a wonderful judge of the Lego competition. If you are a fan you will know Hamish from his show Lego Masters. Hamish was very generous with his time and a huge hit with our students, some of whom are very big fans of the show. To have Hamish here telling us all about Lego was for some of our students a wish came true.

It was our first incursion since this time last year. It's hard to describe the joy and excitement that was so present in the playground on Wednesday afternoon. Our students were delighted to be outside. The shade cloth provided a great atmosphere. We were all together and there was a strong sense of gratitude for being able to be together. A very big thank you to Hamish for his patience and his humour and most of all his generosity.

On Wednesday night a large group of kindergarten parents came to listen to Early Stage One teachers Karla Aspden, Riza Lagado, Melissa Buchanan, our Learning and Support Teacher Margaret Nay and myself talk about how we teach reading in kindergarten. It was a very productive night with lots of interesting questions. We felt the parents left at the end of the evening with a deeper understanding around the complex issue of how children learn to read. Our Librarian Laura Caesar also gave a very interesting talk on how the library works, how it fits into classroom reading programs and what her role consists of. Laura is always happy to recommend books and guide our students. Laura has a vast knowledge of books and more importantly has read most of the books in our Library. Another first for us yesterday was the Early Stage One and Stage One excursion to the newly renovated Australian Museum. STAGE 1 - WATER








Professional Learning



An exhibition of artworks by finalists will be held in Sydney in September, with winners announced on Tuesday 7 September, Threatened Species Day.
